Geography



The Weald

- Visit the galleries to discover the geology of the Weald
- Discuss how the different rocks influence the landscape and the population
- Investigate industries that have grown up because of the Wealden resources
- Investigate museum artefacts related to these industries

Science



Rocks & Minerals

- A practical workshop using the handling collection
- Test for specific gravity and hardness
- Look closely at specimens using microscopes
- Learn about crystal structures



Evolution

- Investigate the fossil record to discover major evolution and extinction events
- Look for similarities and differences in our skeleton and skull collections
- Consider how mutation of genes allows evolution to take place



Living world

- Use our wide collection of natural history to explore how the animal and plant kingdoms are classified
- Consider differences and similarities within and across groups
- How does modern science question this traditional classification?



Environmental Awareness

- Using items from the collections investigate how living things are affected by environmental issues such as climate change
- Investigate loss of habitat and species decline
- Find out the effect the environment can have on items in the collection



Classic Pottery

- Visit the gallery to see our Greek and Roman collections
- Learn a little about pot shape and decoration
- Investigate pieces of pottery from the handling collection
- Design your own pot with reference to the collection



Textiles

- Use items from our extensive textile collection to investigate materials, design and decoration
- Design your own piece with reference to the collection
- Make a piece of felt



Ethnic Design

- Use our peasant art or non-western ethnography collections to investigate ethnic designs
- Design your own item with reference to the collection

History



History of Haslemere

- Explore Haslemere's past using maps, photographs and our Galleries
- Investigate the Cubitt & West ledgers of Haslemere houses
- Investigate the infamous Hindhead sailor's murder
- Use our local history database to find out more about Haslemere and its inhabitants



Holocaust

- Learn from our Education Officer's experience of taking part in two Holocaust related projects with the Imperial War Museum
- Use our resources to find out more about the Holocaust
- Consider how the Holocaust is commemorated through looking at and discussing a number of Holocaust related memorials
